I used to think they were crazy for moving me around so much but now I can kind of see why it happened. As nervous first-time parents, they just wanted what was best for me. While it was tough to keep moving from school to school, I think in retrospect it helped me, too. One of the traits I'm most proud of is an ability to be open and friendly to everyone I meet. A skill honed from always being that new kid in class and having to start over so many times in so many new schools.

No matter what happens this March, it's nice to know that wherever your child goes to school, there are always options in our great city to make a change if necessary. 
