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
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## BOO!

The good were the girls in poodle skirts and saddle shoes who had their malts at the Hamilton Huddle, a parlor on Robertson and Cattaraugus. The cool kids at the school all smoked because it was sophisticated and because every one in the movies lit up so to be popular and in the incrowd, one smoked. We all knew even then that smoking was bad for you and that if you ran track or did any other sports the smoking was something that robbed you of your wind. The high schools were in the Western League which meant Hamilton, Hollywood, Fairfax, Los Angeles, Venice, Dorsey and University. Palisades came later as did Westchester. There were no cell phones of course but typing was a course that was popular back then. There was at one time a requirement that one could



not participate in sports if you did not take a course in ROTC. So there were always plenty of kids in uniform when it was an ROTC day for drill or classes. There were shop classes which were practical but not so popular. However, auto shop taught a lot of kids how to hotwire a car and trouble shoot, and there were plenty of burns from metal shop, and how many nut bowls were turned out from wood shop we will never know. I still have a mulch pile which I learned to make from agriculture shop. Hamilton had an annual car show where the kids could show off their hot rods, sports cars and chopped and channeled customs. We learned to drop and cover to avoid nuclear fall-out and every one had acne and everyone looked forward to graduating not knowing that those were the most formative and important years of our lives.
