## Westside Pavilion Update

was invited to attend a presentation regarding what will become of the Westside Pavilion in the next few years. Cheviot Hills' native Chris Pearson, spoke on behalf of Hudson Pacific Properties, the new owner of the Westside Pavilion and explained to a gathered group of realtors and residents what the company plans to do with the space. He explained that the current structure will get a cosmetic face lift and provide a 525,000 square foot vacancy in its Pico location. 500,000 square feet will be leased to a single, unknown tenant (most likely a big tech company similar



to Google or Netflix). 20,000 square feet will become small retail stores and coffee houses, open to the public as well as the occupants of the aforementioned unknown large-scale tenant. 5,000 square feet will be dedicated to a restaurant (or maybe more than one). Also included will be an open air, park-like expanse of landscaping and greenery. The Westside Tavern and Landmark Movie theaters would be untouched in this renovation and even though Whole Foods was rumored to be high on the list of local residents' priorities, Pearson is not projecting that a market will be part of this structure. He did promise, however, that because the original exterior is going to remain relatively intact, traffic due to construction should not be a major concern. Pearson explained that they will break ground in early 2019 and the project should take about two years to build. Locals can exhale a giant sigh of relief because with all the variables associated with this renovation, there is one institution that is totally protected. Pearson promised with 100% certainty that everyone's favorite burger joint is safe. He stated, "We would never touch the Apple Pan." Phew!
