





Homeowner's burden

A person working around your house is injured; what liability may the homeowner face?

Labor Code 2750.5 provides that anyone performing work for which a contractor's license is required or working for someone who is required to be licensed is presumed to be an employee of the hirer. Under this section, an unlicensed contractor and his employees are employees of the homeowner.

Labor Code 3352 excludes as employees casual residential employees who work less than 52 hours within a 90 day period or who earned less than \$100 within 90 days.

Therefore, when you hire

someone for a longer term project such as a home remodel or substantial construction, you must ensure that he is properly licensed and insured. If he is not and someone is injured, the workers compensation coverage of your homeowners insurance may not be sufficient to cover serious injuries.
