Marinated Flank Steak

- 2 pounds beef flank steak
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
- 1 tbl crushed ginger
- A few splashes sesame oil (optional)
- Sliced scallions

Mix all ingredients and place in a large zip top bag with the meat.

Marinate for a few hours or overnight.

Grill on a hot fire for about 10-12 minutes, turning once. Let it sit for a few minutes before slicing against the grain.
