'm sure like many of you, we had some big plans this summer to get away. Labor Day is not just the end of Summer. It is a day intended to honor the achievements and contribution of workers to society. It became a national holiday in 1894 because of the unrest and riots which had developed in the mid 19th century as a result of the union movement of the time. In the mid to late 19th century factories and mines exploited child labor, as well as struggling citizens, and immigrants. They were working in unsafe conditions for low wages and for unregulated hours. To better there working lives unions began to protest the poor conditions, hours, and pay. The result was massive unrest, strikes, and violence to seek better lives for the workers. In response to the civic upheaval and to repair ties with labor Grover Cleveland proclaimed Labor Day as a federal holiday. The West Side may see it as the day after which it is no longer appropriate to wear white summer clothes, but the civic unrest which was the impetus that created Labor Day is still a force to be reckoned with.
